1. Foreword

Social work promotes social change by providing individual and structural support in dealing with individual, group, community and societal needs and problems. As a discipline and profession, it is based on and contributes to the further development of academic knowledge and practical forms of intervention. Social work navigates the interplay between the state, the market and civil society structures, taking into account changing societal structures and problem situations. Its fields of action, interpretative frameworks and strategies & concepts of action develop and change accordingly. The reciprocal relationship between theory and practice is important in this context. In other words, social work is both an application-orientated and problem-oriented science/discipline and a theory-driven, self-reflective profession.

Social work covers a range of different fields of work and action that are geared towards societal and individual life phases and life situations. It is in constant dialogue with societal developments, the resulting social issues and ways of dealing with them. In this context, it highlights exclusions and develops proposals for inclusion processes. Social workers work in a methodologically/professionally sound manner, incorporating disciplinary and interdisciplinary explanatory and practical knowledge. They work in a network, always in relation to the further development of the profession and discipline. This requires a balanced understanding of the theoretical and action-oriented foundations of social work as a science as well as relevant bodies of knowledge from related disciplines, sound interdisciplinary thinking, a willingness to network and to undergo further training. The BA Social Work study programme in Holzminden teaches both general skills required for a professional life and skills specific to the social work profession against the background of professionally recognised knowledge.

The BA Social Work study programme in Holzminden is based on the Core Curriculum for Social Work Studies of the German Association of Social Work, the Social Work Qualifications Framework of the German Association of Social Work and the German-language version of the International Federation of Social Workers' definition of social work used by the German Association of Social Work. Students receive a generalist education that enables them to apply, develop and critically review familiar and new explanatory and practical approaches in a theory-driven and practice-oriented manner. This equips them to work in a qualified manner in the diverse fields of social work.

Competences to be taught and acquired1:

A) Knowledge and understanding/comprehension

- Knowledge and understanding of the general academic principles and methods of social work and its related fields of study
- Systematic knowledge and application possibilities of important theories, models and methods of social work and their ethical foundation in a national and international framework
- Knowledge and understanding of socio-political conditions and their impact on target groups and the social work profession
- Knowledge and understanding of the problems of different target groups and their backgrounds
- Exemplary insights and systematic consolidation in specific fields of action as well as in the area of research in social work
- Critically reflective awareness of the comprehensive multidisciplinary context of social work

B) Description, analysis, evaluation

 Ability to use knowledge and understanding in a targeted manner to identify, critically analyse and describe known and new tasks, taking into account established academic findings and methods of social work

C) Planning and conceptualisation of social work

- Ability to apply knowledge and skills to develop plans and concepts based on the professional standards
 of social work and interdisciplinary approaches, using appropriate methods and taking into account sociospatial specifics
- Ability to develop plans and concepts in a resource- and emancipation-orientated way, taking into account the needs of the target groups

D) Research and investigation

- Ability to research and categorise relevant literature and data
- Ability to conduct guided (practical) research using qualitative and quantitative methods, taking ethical standards into account

E) Organisation, implementation and evaluation in social work

- · Ability to implement and critically evaluate concepts and plans in a theoretically sound, reflective manner
- Ability to develop and manage relevant resources
- Theory-led, reflective experience of relevant practical activities in social work, taking into account different methods and their scope in different settings

F) General professional skills and approaches in social work

- Ability to work proactively, both alone and in a team
- Strong ability to communicate and interact in a non-discriminatory manner with professional and non-professional stakeholders in the field of work and their societal environment using various media
- Responsibility and a keen awareness of the risks of action for themselves, others and the social work profession
- Ability to recognise and represent the interests and needs of target groups, society, clients and the profession
- Ability to recognise own limits and any need for further training

G) Personality and approaches

- Stable, resilient, reflective personality with the ability to recognise social exclusion and the people and institutions involved
- Ability to develop a professional role based on a considered view of the world and people and the recognition of the dignity of all people

The BA Social Work study programme is a 6-semester course with integrated practical components (180 credits). The study programme comprises 21 modules, some of which are designed as elective modules. In the first year of study, the focus is on teaching the general foundations of academic work and key skills relevant to the profession, as well as the subject-specific study of social work as a discipline and profession. Basic methodological and legal knowledge is also taught. In the second year of the programme, students acquire more analytical and reflective skills as well as target group-specific knowledge with the aim of tackling new tasks and developing their own questions. In the third year of study, students develop further conceptual and planning skills in order to develop and evaluate problemoriented and goal-oriented approaches to specific challenges in social work. Further professional profile development is also encouraged here. As a self-contained unit, the fifth semester is particularly suitable for a semester abroad. The degree programme is usually completed in the sixth semester with the bachelor's thesis. The practical components integrated into the degree programme (750 hours – 25 CP) mean students can shorten the recognised probationary period by half a year. Following their studies, bachelor's graduates can complete a recognised probationary period of at least six months, which is a prerequisite for state accreditation. Part-time study is also possible.



The professional and interdisciplinary knowledge is organised into five study areas: General Principles of Social Work / Social Work Science, Academic Work, Framework for Social Work, Forms of Action and Fields of Action. The modules assigned to the study areas form the thematic knowledge and competence building blocks.

In the course of the degree programme, students must choose two of the four available forms of action. In the first semester, students choose between Case Management, Community Work/Social Space Orientation, Social Work with Groups and Media Education. The two selected modules are each completed with a graded assessment in the second semester.

In addition, the following two priority areas are planned in the fields of action:

- 1) Social Work with Children and Adolescents
- 2) Social Work with Adults

The focus areas follow a life-stage approach to social work and take into account the specific life and problem situations of the target groups in rural areas. Networking in the region in the form of cooperation with various practical institutions, international cooperation, and research and teaching in a theory-practice network are the prerequisites for a degree programme oriented towards the central questions and tasks of social work.

Most modules are designed based on the following learning theory and didactic considerations: after an introduction to the contents and areas of competence of the module, these are explored in greater depth in the following semester. This enables students to choose areas of specialisation and key skills based on their interests.

The modules Professional Identity Formation (2) and Fields of Action (15.1, 15.2, 16.1, 16.2) incorporate practical components. This allows for a close integration of theory and practice. The preparatory and follow-up sessions for the practical phases take place in these modules, and competence-related and field-specific content is also offered.

Excursions are part of the courses and thus part of the compulsory or elective course and the performance required therein. They are listed and publicised in the seminar schedules. Depending on the module, courses may be held at a location other than the HAWK. They are listed and publicised in the seminar schedules.

The BA programme provides an initial professional qualification and is also a prerequisite for MA studies in social work.
